Part 1: Completing the Cal State Apply Application for Transfer

Citizenship/Residency Questions in the 'Personal Information' Section

On the **U.S. Citizenship Status** question, Undocumented/AB540/DACA applications select "None."

On the **Residency** question, answer all questions about residency (where you live) according to your own residency. **Note, this question is NOT asking about legal residency status, but rather whether or not you regard CA as your permanent home, if you claim CA residency, and how long you have lived in CA.** If you are an undocumented/AB540/DACA applicant and you regard CA as your permanent home and have lived in CA for at least 1 year and 1 day, the CSU system suggests you answer the residency question as follows, including when your present stay in CA began:

NOTE - If you meet AB540/ AB 2000 guidelines and are being charged non-resident tuition, contact your campus and submit a [California Nonresident Tuition Exemption](#) form, also known as an AB 540 / AB 2000 affidavit.

Once the student has been accepted to a CSU campus, the student should file an [AB 540 / AB 2000 California Nonresident Tuition Exemption](#) "Non-Resident Tuition Exemption Affidavit (i.e. AB540/2000 affidavit) with the school. The affidavit requires that students without legal immigration status state they have filed or will file an application to legalize their immigration status as soon as they are eligible to do so.

You will need to submit a separate affidavit to each college you are applying to, but you do not need to submit a new affidavit when you are continuously enrolled at the same college.

The law requires that the information you share on the affidavit be kept confidential. (See California Education Code §68130.5(d): "Student information obtained in the implementation of this section is confidential.") Student information is also protected by the federal [Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act \(FERPA\)](#).

Eligibility for AB 540/2000 Status

To be eligible for AB 540, students must meet **all** the following criteria:

1. The student must have:
 - attended a high school (public or private) in California for three or more years, **or**
 - attained credits earned in California from a California high school equivalent to three or more years of full-time high school course work **and** attended a combination of elementary, middle and/or high schools in California for a total of three or more years, **and**
2. The student must have graduated from a California high school or attained the equivalent prior to the start of the term (for example, passing the GED or California High School Proficiency exam) **and**
3. The student must file an affidavit with the college or university stating that he or she has filed an application to legalize his or her immigration status, or will file an application as soon as he or she is eligible to do so.

Other Non-resident Tuition Exemptions: T and U Visa Holders

Students who are not immigrants and who are victims of trafficking, domestic violence, and other serious crimes who have been granted T or U visa status under Title 8 of the United States Code sections 1101(a)(15)(T) or (U) are eligible for this exemption as well. The student must file an exemption request including a signed affidavit with the college that indicates the student has met all applicable conditions described above. Student information obtained in this process is strictly confidential unless disclosure is required under law.

Social Security Number in the 'Other Information' section of 'Personal Information'

Social Security number: The application will ask you to enter your Social Security number (SSN). If you have qualified for [Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals \(DACA\)](#) and have been issued a SSN, enter that number on your application.

- If you do not have a SSN, you can leave that item blank on the application and the campus you are applying to will assign you a temporary number.
- If you obtain your SSN after submitting your application, please update the campus you will be attending by the time you enroll.

Part II: Applying for Financial Aid & Scholarships

Financial Aid:

The Cal State Apply Admissions Application Fee Waiver is available to students who qualify for an AB540/2000 nonresident tuition exemption and meet the income guidelines.

The California Dream Act (CA Assembly Bills 130 and 131) made it possible for students who meet AB540/2000 criteria to apply for state funded financial aid such as, Cal Grants, Middle Class Scholarship, California State University Grant, and EOP Grant.

The California Dream Loan Program (CA Senate Bill 1210) was approved starting in 2015-2016 and currently UC and CSU campuses offer Dream Loans to eligible AB-540 students. Students should contact their campus for more information.

To be eligible for CA state financial aid, undocumented students who meet the AB540/2000 criteria must complete the CA Dream Act Application by the March the 2nd, 2018 priority deadline: <https://dream.csac.ca.gov/>

Note - Undocumented/AB540/DACA students are still not eligible for Federal Financial Aid and should NOT complete the FAFSA Application.

UC APPLICATION GUIDE FOR UNDOCUMENTED STUDENTS

Tips for filling out the undergraduate application

Social security number

- If you have a valid **Social Security Number (SSN)** — for instance, because of immigration proceedings — enter that on the application.
- If you have an **SSN for work purposes** (usually through DACA), use that where the application asks for an SSN.
- If you don't have a valid SSN or SSN for work purposes, but do have an **Individual Tax Payer Identification Number (ITIN)**, use the ITIN in place of an SSN on the application.
- If you don't have a valid SSN, SSN for work purposes, or ITIN, leave this item blank.

Make sure that the number you use on this item in the application is the same as the SSN or ITIN you enter on your Cal Dream Act Application.

Country of citizenship

As an undocumented student, you have the option to choose “No Selection.” This option is considered a valid response and we recommend this choice for undocumented applicants, including those with DACA status. By choosing “No Selection,” you'll avoid being asked other questions about permanent residency and visa status that are not applicable to you.

California residency

You'll be asked the following questions to determine if you are a California resident for admissions purposes:

- Have you attended a California high school for three or more years and will graduate or have graduated from a California high school?
- How long have you lived in California?
- Is your parent or legal guardian a legal permanent resident of California? [if you're under 18]
- Is your parent, legal guardian, spouse or registered domestic partner an employee of UC or a UC-affiliated national laboratory?

If you're considered a California resident for admissions purposes, you may be eligible for our application fee waiver and you'll be considered for admission using the 3.0 minimum GPA (rather than the 3.4 GPA for nonresident applicants).

NOTE - If you meet AB540/ AB 2000 guidelines and are being charged non-resident tuition, contact your campus and submit a [California Nonresident Tuition Exemption](#) form, also known as an AB 540 / AB 2000 affidavit.

Once the student has been accepted to a UC campus, the student should file an [AB 540 / AB 2000 California Nonresident Tuition Exemption](#) “Non-Resident Tuition Exemption Affidavit (i.e. AB540/2000 affidavit) with the school. The affidavit requires that students without legal immigration status state they have filed or will file an application to legalize their immigration status as soon as they are eligible to do so.

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Personal insight questions

It's up to you if you want to use one of the personal insight question responses or the additional comments section to discuss your undocumented status. It isn't required, but it can provide more context for your application by helping reviewers understand your circumstance and resources. This information may also be used during the scholarship screening process. It will not be used outside the application process.

Parent citizenship information

When you submit your application, you'll be asked questions about your parents' citizenship status. For example: *Is your parent a U.S. citizen? Has your parent been physically present in CA for the last 3 years?* These questions are optional and you don't have to answer them, but if you do, we encourage you to answer them truthfully — any information you provide will not affect your admission decision. This information is used only to help UC determine residency.

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The California Dream Act (CA Assembly Bills 130 and 131) made it possible for students who meet AB540/2000 criteria to apply for state funded financial aid such as, Cal Grants, UC grants and scholarships, and private scholarships. Some UC campuses also offer institutional work-study and loans for undocumented students.

The California Dream Loan Program (CA Senate Bill 1210) was approved starting in 2015-2016 and currently UC and CSU campuses offer Dream Loans to eligible AB-540 students. Students should contact their campus for more information.
