
Chabot College Trends in Student Educational Goals: Falls 1994-2014

Students state their educational goal when they first enroll at Chabot, and they update it each semester. Between Fall 1994 and Fall 2014, the educational goals of Chabot students changed considerably, especially in the last ten years. The percentage of students intending to transfer to a 4-year college increased from 40% to 56%, and the percentage of students with job training goals declined from 21% to 12%. However, the percentage of those who intended to earn an A.A. or A.S. degree without transfering remained at or just below 11%. The percentage of students who are undecided remained about 22 percent for many years, and recently declined to 13 percent.
