

Course success and withdrawal rates, by courses and students Fall 2000 to Fall 2017 Females

Chabot female students' success rates have remained stable at 67-69 percent in the past eight years, rising from an average 64-67 percent in early 2000's. Withdrawal rates dropped from 21-24 percent in early 2000's to16-17 percent in recent years. Non-success rates (D, F, No Credit, No Pass, or Incomplete) have gone up slightly from an average of 12 percent during the early 2000's to 15 percent in Fall 2017. The percentage of students who

withdrew from all their courses fell from 18 percent in the early 2000's to 10-13 percent in recent years. Compared to the early 2000's, students are now more likely to stay enrolled in their classes, whether they are succeeding or not.

Chabot male students' success rates have remained stable at 68-70 percent in the past eight years, rising from an average of 64-67 percent in early 2000's. Withdrawal rates dropped from 20-25 percent in early 2000's to 14-16 percent in recent years. Non-success rates (D, F, No Credit, No Pass, or Incomplete) have gone up slightly from an average of 13 percent during the early 2000's to 15 percent in Fall 2017. The percentage of students who withdrew from all their courses fell from 17 percent in the early 2000's to 10 percent in recent years. Compared to the early 2000's, students are now more likely to stay enrolled in their classes, whether they are succeeding or not.
