
## Chabot College Course Success and Withdrawal Rates, by Course Enrollments and Students Fall 2003 to Fall 2022 Women

Course success rates for Chabot students whom identify as women have remained stable at 66-70 percent in the past 20 years, with it being at 70 percent in Fall 2022. Withdrawal rates dropped from 20-22 percent until 2007, to 16-19 percent until 2019, and down to 15 percent in Fall 2022. Non-success rates (D, F, No Credit, No Pass, or Incomplete) had gone down slightly from an average of 14 percent until 2019 to 9 percent in 2020, rising back up to 15 percent in Fall 2022. The percentage of students who withdrew from all their courses fell from 12-13 percent in the early 2000's to 9-11 percent until Fall 2020, where it rose to 13 percent and fell back to 9 percent in Fall 2022.



## Course Success and Withdrawal Rates, by Course Enrollments and Students Fall 2003 to Fall 2022 Men

Since 2017, Chabot students who identify as men had higher course success rates than anytime since 2003, with 2022 being the highest. Course success rates, traditionally not higher than 68 percent before 2010, rose to 69 percent in Fall 2011, then to 73 percent in Fall 2022. Withdrawal rates, stable at 20-23 percent, dropped to 16 percent in Fall 2021, and declined further to 13 percent in Fall 2022. In addition, the percentage of students who withdrew from all their courses fell to 8-10 percent in the early 2010's, and to 7 percent in Fall 2022. However, non-success rates (D, F, No Credit, No Pass, or Incomplete) averaged around 15 percent since 2003. Students who identify as men are now more likely to stay enrolled in at least some of their classes, as only 7 percent withdraw from all of their classes; this is down from Fall 2020 and Fall 2021 (10-11 percent).
