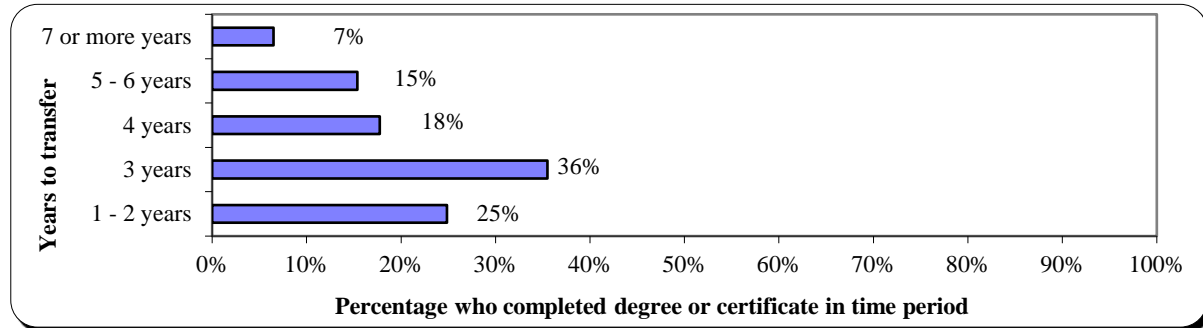


Chabot College

Survey of Spring 2017 Transfer Students

Over 60 percent of Chabot students transferring to a 4-year college in Fall 2017 completed their program within three years; the other 40 percent took four or more years, according to the Spring 2017 Transfer Survey. The majority persevered to transfer by attending every term and attending mostly full-time, whether or not they were working. Although 97 percent will be attending their 4-year college full-time, 75 percent of these students plan to work in Fall 2017. The Transfer Survey was filled out by 190 students—79 who attended the transfer ceremony in May 2017 and 111 students who filled out the online version. This represents 22 percent of the 850+ transfer students from Chabot in 2016-17.
