This is great. I carry a KleanKanteen with me every day.

Here's my tip:

Keep all electronic devices plugged into a surge protector -- and whenever you leave your office, even to go to class for an hour, especially overnight or for the weekend, don't just power down your computer -- turn the surge protector off.

Most electronic devices now continue to use electricity even when they're turned "off". That includes the TVs in the classrooms. If it has a remote control, or a pilot light (a red that that tells you it's "off"), it's using electricity. Cell phone charger? If it's plugged in, it's using electricity. Same with your radio.

Think of that little red light as a tiny coal or gas fire, like the pilot light on your stove -- because that's what it is.

If everyone on campus were to power everything down when not in use, Chabot would save hundreds, if not thousands, of dollars per month on electricity.

And the example might help stave off, say, a new power plant in the neighborhood.

And at some point, the lower electricity use might enable roof-mounted solar plants to power campus entirely.

In which case, we'd be doing our part to get to Zero Carbon Emissions, which we must reach to stave off the worst of catastrophic warming -- as this Washington Post story explains:

Is the chalk we now use RECYCABLE?

- . *Blackboard chalk* is a substance used for drawing on rough surfaces, as it readily crumbles leaving particles that stick loosely to these surfaces. Blackboard chalk, often supplied in sticks about 10 cm long, is currently made from the mineral gypsum (calcium sulfate) rather than calcium carbonate.
- . In lawn tennis, chalk used to be used to mark the boundary lines of the court (nowadays it is mostly titanium dioxide). This gives the advantage that, if the ball hits the line, a cloud of chalk or pigment dust can be seen.
- 0. In gymnastics, rock-climbing, bouldering and weight-lifting, chalk - usually in the form of magnesium carbonate - is applied to the hands to prevent slipping.
- . *Tailor's chalk* traditionally is hard chalk used to make temporary markings on cloth, for instance by tailors. Nowadays it is usually made from talc (magnesium silicate).
  - Sidewalk chalk* is sticks of colored chalk used to draw on sidewalks, streets, and driveways. It is often done by children, but in many cities, talented adult artists create masterpieces on the walkways.

**Is the proposed white board non-permanent marker (typically made up of plastic, cloth material for the tip, and a colored liquid) RECYCABLE?**

A **non-permanent marker** is a marker often used for making markings where permanence is not required or would be a drawback, as for example marking on overhead projectors or overhead transparencies, or whiteboards. It can be erased with a cloth or paper towel. Some pens require a wet cloth, while dry erase markers can be erased with a dry one.

These markers are generally used on non-porous surfaces, as the ink used in the marker has to adhere to the writing surface without being absorbed.
