One of the biggest challenges we faced during the pandemic was switching to remote instruction, shedding light on the impact teachers and schools have on everyday life. Yet the Chabot Association of Teacher Education, or CATE, has been hard at work developing a teacher preparation pathway in conjunction with Early Childhood Development. The purpose is to inspire the next generation of teachers from TK through K-12 and beyond, by finding ways to support their

journey early on, and by promoting this profession that is a catalyst for social change. We started this pipeline by focusing on four major areas of inquiry: What are the best ways of supporting future teachers academically to make sure they fulfill transfer requirements and obtain an AAT degree? How can future teachers support one another on campus and learn from each other about teaching? How do we connect future teachers to experiences? In these four areas we made some headway by creating a teachers club on campus to help find students who are already interested in teaching and hopefully encourage more to join! We formed a team on campus to help us carry the work. Also, we developed a friendly CATE web page in case students want to get basic information on teaching. We obtained a small grant to help us cover costs for CBEST preparation and fingerprinting services. We partnered with Cal State East Bay, St. Mary's College, San Francisco State and Holy Names University who have presented their credentialing programs to our students. Every year a group of dedicated Chabot faculty, staff, and students organize Chabot's Annual Earth Week events. Planning for Earth Week begins in the Fall semester and members of campus are invited to participate in the planning process. Earth Week events often feature a variety of speakers, panels, student projects, film discussions, resources, tree planting/gardening ceremonies, poetry readings, and art/photo exhibits. These events examine the effects of climate change and pollution, the rights and wisdom of indigenous communities, environmental policies, possible solutions to environmental crises, and the intersections between environmental and social justice issues. This year's 20+ virtual events focused on the following critical themes: Indigenous Wisdom, Environmental Justice and Advocacy, From Food Insecurity to Security, and California Water Policy.

Guided Pathways Update By Abigail Patton

In year four of the implementation of guided pathways, we continue to advance and integrate equity through our college processes. We have redesigned our onboarding process and now request that students express interest in a learning community from the point of application. Next, we are providing intentional onboarding support by deploying counselors into our feeder schools during their synchronous time to provide a first-semester planning session for all students who have applied to Chabot. We have also simplified steps for students by developing a comprehensive student profile webpage slated to launch in the near future.

We are offering a free Summer Bridge Program, designed to incorporate the needs of all Learning Communities and provide students with the opportunity to getting an head start.

Momentum for program mapping is underway with a goal of completing all program maps by November 2021 and potentially launching spring 2022. Lastly, we are beginning the process for a website redesign to ensure consistency and clarity as we launch the Learning and Career Pathways program maps.
