

Please join me in welcoming Dr. Jamal Cooks as Chabot College's interim Vice President of Academic Services. As the former Dean of Language Arts at Chabot, Dr. Cooks successfully implemented AB 705 procedures and policies, co-founded the Chabot Association of Teacher Education (CATE) as a pathway to careers in education, and served as the administrator for the RISE Program (our student support program for formerly incarcerated students). Dr. Cooks is also an active participant in numerous scholarly and community organizations.



Dr. Cooks also brings distinction as a scholar and university professor. Prior to community college administration, Dr. Cooks served as a full professor at San Francisco State University and as the Associate Director for the Educational Leadership Doctoral Program there. As Director, he increased the number of faculty of color in the Program, provided training in culturally relevant pedagogy, and chaired over 20 doctoral dissertations.

Originally from Oakland, CA, Dr. Cooks has a doctorate in Language, Literacy, and Culture and an M.A. in Curriculum Development from the University of Michigan and a Bachelors of Arts degree in Political Economy of Industrial Societies from the University of California at Berkeley. He lives in Oakland with his family.

Chabot College Voices Behind the Masks Heather Clements

How do you feel about seeing more students on campus?

It was lonely on campus last year. It has been good to see more people here and walking around.

Quality Focus Essay

The CALTeam received 58 participants in the QFE surveys. College community members voiced that 10x10, Guided Pathways, and technology are the most important projects for Chabot to focus on in the years to come. The CALTeam took the input from the survey as well as the results of the Institutional Self-Evaluation Report (ISER), to determine what the focus of the Quality Focus Essay projects.

Project #1: Black Excellence Collective 10x10 Project with a technology component*

- •To improve course success rates and persistence rates among African American students
 - •African American students and Pacific Islander students have course success rates consistently well below the college average (see **Figure B-2**)
- •From Fall 2015 to Spring 2020, 74% to 78% of new non-Black students persisted from fall to spring, whereas only 63% to 66% of new Black students persisted fall to spring (see **Figure B-9**)
- •To address the equity gap in *success rates* between African American students and all other students in distance education (see 2020-21 Chabot Annual Distance Education Report)

Project #2: Guided Pathways Initiative with a technology component *

- •To decrease students' time to degree completion
 - •Chabot College's four-year degree completion rates for first-time college students with a transfer and/or degree educational goal ranged from 10% to 15% for the Fall 2013 to Fall 2016 cohorts. The five-year degree completion rates for first-time college students with a transfer and/or degree educational goal ranged from 13% to 17% for these same cohorts (see **Figure B-13**).
- •To empower students to realize their educational goals by providing clear navigation to degrees, certificates, transfers, careers, and personal growth
- •To better integrate services and instruction in the areas of new student onboarding and Learning and Career Pathways
