

## Chabot College Student Characteristics

### ESL Students who passed ESL 110C or 110D vs. All other ESL students

#### Fall 2018

ESL students are defined here as those who are taking or have ever taken an ESL course at Chabot. Of all students enrolled at Chabot College in Fall 2018, 1,010, or 7 percent, had taken an ESL class at some point during their time at Chabot. Of these, close to half had passed ESL 110C or 110D, the highest courses. This table is a comparison of the student characteristics of those who had and had not passed those courses. ESL students earned 7 percent of degrees and 15 percent of certificates.
