Chabot College Student Surveys: Trends 2007-2017 Student engagement in learning at Chabot

In 2017, more Chabot students than ever participated in small discussion groups (74%), communicated with their instructor electronically (66%), made a presentation in class (54%), discussed class topics with other students (49%), met with their instructor about their assignments or progress (38%), and formed study groups (34%).

These are all indicators of increased student engagement in learning—measured by how often students participate in or initiate active learning activities, either within or outside the classroom.

Another measure of student engagement is how much the instructors encourage students to participate in class. In 2015 and 2017 Chabot instructors got high marks for making students feel respected, included, and encouraged. Over 80% of students felt encouraged to participate, and over 70% felt that instructors communicated a belief in their ability to do the work and succeed in college.

The Student Satisfaction Survey was conducted in October 2017 in a representative sample of seventy-seven on-campus course sections and was completed by 1,702 students (59% full time and 41% part time).
