Student Satisfaction Survey: Fall 2019

First Generation College Students by Race-Ethnicity

First generation college students are often defined in one of two ways, students for whom: 1) no parent or guardian attended any college, or 2) no parent or guardian obtained a Bachelor's degree. For about half of Chabot students, neither parent(s) nor guardian(s) attended college, and for about three quarters of Chabot students, no parent or guardian earned a Bachelor's degree. Chicano/Latinx students are the most likely to be first-generation students.

The Student Satisfaction Survey was conducted in October 2019 in a representative sample of 79 on-campus course sections. Surveys were completed by 1,544 students (59% full-time; 41% part-time).

- in the first generation of their family to attend college (neither parent/guardian attended college) **OR**
- in the first generation of their family to earn a BA/BS degree (neither parent/guardian earned a BA/BS)
