Spring 2019 Transfer/Graduation Survey
Student Self-Reported Learning of Institutional Learning Outcomes

Chabot has five institutional learning outcomes (ILOs) in which we strive to foster student learning: communication, critical thinking, civic responsibility, global and cultural involvement, and the development of the whole person. Students are surveyed when they transfer or graduate to assess how much they believe they have learned in each of the ILO areas during their time at Chabot. The Spring 2019 Transfer/Graduation Survey was filled out by 337 students, who transferred to a 4-year institution in Fall 2019 and/or graduated with a degree or certificate in 2018/19. Most students reported that they learned substantial amounts in these five ILOs. In the majority of ILO goal areas, over 70 to 90 percent of the students reported that they had learned *some* or *a lot*.
