



Chabot College serves a diverse population of 13,500 students in five major ethnic groups. Between 50 and 90 percent of each ethnic group are first generation college students. With the majority of each ethnic group also starting community college at the Basic Skills level in both English and Math, our students need substantial guidance and support to navigate through college to successful degree and transfer outcomes.

Student Support (Re)defined




Student Support (Re)defined aimed to understand how community colleges can feasibly deliver support both inside and outside the classroom to improve success for all students. We asked nearly 900 students from 13 California community colleges what they think supports their educational success—paying special attention to the factors African Americans and Latinos cited as important to their achievement.



Six Success Factors: Through Student Support (Re)defined, the RP Group reviewed leading studies on effective support practices and interviewed both practitioners and researchers to identify “six success factors” that contribute to students’ achievement:

- **Directed:** Students have a goal and know how to achieve it
- **Focused:** Students stay on track—keeping their eyes on the prize
- **Nurtured:** Students feel somebody wants and helps them to succeed
- **Engaged:** Students actively participate in class and extracurricular activities
- **Connected:** Students feel like they are part of the college community
- **Valued:** Students’ skills, talents, abilities and experiences are recognized; they have opportunities to contribute on campus and feel their contributions are appreciated



The RP Group conducted Student Support (Re)defined with support from The Kresge Foundation (2011-2014) and participated as a key partner in Completion by Design (2011-2013), an ongoing initiative of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.
